8 Steps of the Mining Cycle

- Step 1: Establish the Foundations for Resource Stewardship: Policy, Regulations, Institutions and the Rule of Law
- Step 2: Participatory Planning from Exploration to Closure
- **Step 3: Exploration**
- **Step 4: Feasibility and Licensing**
- **Step 5: Mine Development and Construction**
- **Step 6: Production**
- **Step 7: Closure**
- **Step 8: Post-Closure**
